# GOOD SHEPHERD SUNDAY

World Day of Prayer for Vocations

"Called to sow seeds of hope and to build peace." Pope Francis' Message 2024

The World Day of Prayer for Vocations is observed every year on the Fourth Sunday of Easter, also known as Good Shepherd Sunday. In Jesus, the Good Shepherd, we find the essence of every vocation. Each person is called, and everyone plays a role within the Church.

Today is a significant moment to show appreciation for those who have accepted God's call to the ordained priesthood. They commit themselves to spreading the Gospel, sharing their lives and the Eucharist, sowing seeds of hope, and unveiling the magnificence of God's realm to all.

Pope Francis, in his message for the 61st World Day of Prayer for Vocations, says, "In this light, I would say once more, as I did at World Youth Day in Lisbon: "Rise up!" Let us awaken from sleep, let us leave indifference behind, let us open the doors of the prison in which we so often enclose ourselves, so that each of us can discover his or her proper vocation in the Church and in the world, and become a pilgrim of hope and a builder of peace! Let us be passionate about life, and commit ourselves to caring lovingly for those around us, in every place where we live. Let me say it again: "Have the courage to commit!" Father Oreste Benzi, a tireless apostle of charity, ever on the side of the poor and the defenseless, used to say that no one is so poor as to have nothing to give, and no one is so rich as not to need something to receive. Let us rise up, then, and set out as pilgrims of hope, so that, as Mary was for Elizabeth, we too can be messengers of joy, sources of new life and artisans of fraternity and peace."

Did you know that among the early Christians, the Sign of the Cross was probably the most universal expression of faith. It appears often in the documents of the period. In most places, the custom was simply to trace the cross upon the forehead.



Some writers (such as St Jerome and St Augustine) describe Christians tracing the cross on the forehead, then the lips and then the heart, as modern Western Catholics do just before the reading of the Gospel. This is not only an act of worship, it is a reminder of who we are. "Father, Son and Holy Spirit" reflects a family relationship, the inner life and eternal communion of God. By making the Sign of the Cross we begin the Holy Mass with a reminder that we are children of God. (excerpt from The Lamb's Supper, Scott Hahn).

## WORLD DAY OF PRAYER FOR VOCATIONS AND SEMINARIAN APPEAL 21 APRIL 2024

On the 4th Sunday of Easter Time, 21 April 2024, we are invited to pray for those called to serve through priestly vocation. The day also marks the beginning of our National Vocations Awareness Week. We are greatly blessed by the generosity and enthusiasm of our men training for priesthood.

Currently, we have one seminarian Dung Manh Phan at Holy Cross Seminary in Auckland. After returning from Vietnam, in July 2022 Dung studied papers for his degree. In 2023 he joined the year one cohort for his formation year 1 and this year, he is in year 2, studying fulltime towards his theology degree. Lam van Nguyen, Hung van Nguyen, and Duy Pham, from Vietnam, arrived in New Zealand in 2022 to learn English before hopefully joining the seminary. However, it was with sadness that Duy returned to Vietnam early this year, due to health reasons.

For young people, remember that being a priest is always another option for your life. If you are thinking about it, please talk to any of our diocesan priests you may know. Parents, if your children are interested in the vocation of priesthood, please encourage them, and pray for them. **FR TRUNG'S JOURNEY TO PRIESTHOOD:** I was born and raised in a catholic family being one of seven children. Many of you would know that there are six boys and one girl in my family. For most Vietnamese babies, when they get baptised, the parents choose a patron saint for them. It is not recorded in the civil documents, but it will be in the baptism record. Our parents have chosen St Joseph as the patron saint for three of the boys and St Peter for the other three, and Lien is Mary. My parents told me that they prayed hard that there might be one of us who would become a priest in the future, especially from those who they chose St Peter as their patron saint.

Well, God must have been listening! Two "Josephs" and two "Peters" are following the vocation to the priesthood. I was ordained as a priest on the 6<sup>th</sup> of June 2020. My younger brother was ordained on the 27<sup>th</sup> of May 2023 who belongs to The Missionaries of St. Charles - Scalabrinians, and is now serving in Florida, US. On the 15<sup>th</sup> of June 2024, my older brother will be ordained as a priest for the Arch Diocese of Washington DC, and my youngest brother has made his First Profession and is studying in Rome with the Institute of Charity (The Rosminians).

Looking back to my vocation, I think that it is based on "two yeses". I became an altar boy when I was 10 years old. One day, in the morning, I went to Mass with my father as normal. He went to see the priest after Mass for something because he did voluntary work for the parish council. I was following my father. The priest saw me and asked "Do you want to go with me"? I asked him, "Where and when?" He told me that he was about to move to another place and if I wanted to, I could go with him". Without thinking, I said "Yes". Assisting priests in a parish is common thing in Vietnam. This was the first yes that started my journey. It was the 10<sup>th</sup> of December 2001 when I was 12 years old.

I stayed with him for 7 years. My main job was preparing the altar and serving in the Mass every morning. In 2007, I went to Ho Chi Minh City to study at the university. My major was philosophy and during that time I began to recognise the strength of my vocation. I had always wanted to be a priest and serve God.

In 2011, when I have been asked to come to New Zealand to train to be a priest. I was very surprised and thought: "Am I brave enough to leave my country? Can I leave my family? I began to think and pray that I would make the right decision for my life. After many months of praying and asking my spiritual director for his advice, I said "Yes". That second' yes' lead me to the Palmerston North Diocese.

I arrived in New Zealand on the 18<sup>th</sup> of May 2012. Palmerston North Diocese has become my home. I feel the love of all the people around me. When I look back on my journey, I know that I would not be standing here without the grace from God, through the prayers of all of you, and especially your help and support. You look after me as your child, talking to me as your friend and loving me as you love God. I am always grateful for that.

Today is Good Shepherd Sunday. I ask you humbly to pray for me and all the priests that we may serve God and you, His people, ever more faithfully. Fr Trung. Congratulations to Fr Craig Butler, Whanganui Parish Priest, (and our Fr Craig, former Parish Priest here in New Plymouth) who will represent the Catholic priests of Aotearoa New Zealand at a gathering of 300 priests from around the world at the Vatican at the "Parish Priests for the Synod: An



International Meeting" in Rome from 28 April to 2 May. Fr Craig was nominated by the NZ Catholic Bishops Conference to attend the gathering, which is being held as part of the countdown to October's second session of the Synod on Synodality.

Fr Craig has been a priest for nearly 30 years in the Diocese of Palmerston North, including 22 as a parish priest. He is a member of the diocesan College of Consultors, the Council of Priests and was the Local Administrator for several years until Bishop John Adams was appointed bishop last year. His work has included youth ministry and helping international priests to settle in New Zealand.

"I'm humbled to be asked to go," says Fr Craig. "I'm looking forward to the experience and the chance to meet Pope Francis there, something I never thought I would experience. I wrote to the priests of New Zealand recently saying I've been asked to go to Rome as a parish priest, knowing I couldn't possibly represent them all, and asking if they would share with me their experiences of the synodal process. While I wasn't hugely involved with the Synod process at the parish level when it began, when I became Local Administrator, I became very involved. It's a wonderful way to hear what the Holy Spirit has to say to us from people whose voices are not always heard."



Kia ora, I am Nigel Murray from Woodville in the Tararua District of our diocese. Since completing my seminary studies in Auckland in 2013, I undertook a 40-day pilgrimage, walking the Camino de Santiago. A "true" road to Emmaus experience. I was destined to join a missionary community in the Philippines when a Super Typhoon hit the central region. Seeing the news reports, I was prompted further in God's call for me to go and help. Plunging into the depths of mission initially, I gained a wellspring of experience that equipped me further in my vocation and grounded my faith further in service of others, that is the Church. Circumstances in God's will and timing led me to finish my journey in the Philippines near the end of 2017.

Over the last 6 years, I ended up in Perth, Western Australia. Continually being prompted by the Holy Spirit and exploring my vocation further in Perth with the local Church, God had not given up on me. Our new bishop, John Adams, had arrived, after much patience and prayer. I was further prompted by my friends and the Holy Spirit to write a letter and then meet with Bishop Adams last December, while on my holiday trip to be with family for Christmas. The decision was made for me to pack up my life in Western Australia and discern further my vocation to priesthood back in my home diocese of Palmerston North. I have just had a month in Hastings Parish with Fr. Marcus and Fr. Vijay. Now here in New Plymouth, I hope to have a good learning experience with the joy of meeting you over the coming weeks.

Discernment is a gift from God; my journey of discernment is long. It requires of me to stay on the path of holiness. However, not only depending on my own personal experience, I journey with the people I am present with, the priests, and my bishop who discern

alongside me. With God's grace through the Holy Spirit, and with a burning heart, I am impelled to make the leap of faith. "They left their nets and followed Him" (Mk 1:18). The Peace of Christ be with you all, Nigel.

In September 2023, Bishop John Adams appointed me to represent the Diocese of Palmerston North on the New Zealand Catholic Bishop Conference (NZCBC) Council for Young People - Te Roopu o ngā Rangatahi o te Rūnanga o ngā Pīhopa Katorika o Aotearoa.

The Council for Young People comprises Nick Wilson(Chair), Samuel Brebner (Auckland), Christyna Malietoa-Brown (Hamilton), Susilo Kentjana (Palmerston North), Louise Lloyd (Wellington), Mark Currie (Christchurch), Linea Simons (Dunedin), and Miriama Allen (Tūranga Māori), with Bishop John Adams as the Bishop's Representative.

Let me share a bit of who we are. The Council for Young People is established by the New Zealand Catholic Bishops' Conference. We support the Catholic Bishops of New Zealand in their ministry among young people, reporting through the Conference's Commission for Church. The Council will be guided in its work by scripture and policies set by the NZCBC, in addition to consultation with Te Rūnanga o Te Hāhi Katorika ō Aotearoa to deepen bi-cultural understandings. We meet twice a year for face-to-face meetings and regular Zoom meetings.

Last week, I journeyed to Auckland from Wednesday, 10 April, to Thursday, 11 April 2024, for our first face-to-face meeting this year. During our discussions, we covered various topics such as youth formation in worship and Liturgy, Pope Francis' announcement of a Jubilee Year in 2025, the Pilgrimage for young people, World Youth Day in 2027, and forthcoming conventions for young people. "In 2027, I envision 500 young people from New Zealand, with 100 from the Diocese of Palmerston North, participating in World Youth Day in Seoul, South Korea," expressed Bishop John during the meeting. This objective sets the tone as the council commences its efforts and preparations for WYD 2027.

I am honoured to contribute to shaping the faith of young people in New Zealand, particularly in the Diocese of Palmerston North. Your prayers are valued as we embark on this meaningful journey.
