EUCHARISTIC PRAYER

What Happens:

The Eucharistic Prayer is the central and most solemn part of the Mass, often referred to as the "Canon of the Mass." It is a powerful moment of worship where the Church's greatest prayer of thanksgiving and consecration is offered to God. This prayer begins with the Preface and includes several key elements: the Sanctus (Holy, Holy, Holy), the consecration of the bread and wine, the Mystery of Faith, the memorial acclamation, and concludes with the final doxology. During this prayer, the bread and wine are transformed into the Body and Blood of Christ, and the entire assembly is invited to participate in the sacred mystery.

How We Do It:

The priest, acting in the person of Christ, prays the Eucharistic Prayer aloud on behalf of the entire congregation. The prayer begins with the Preface, a prayer of thanksgiving to God, which varies according to the liturgical season, or the feast being celebrated. The Preface leads into the Sanctus, a hymn of praise where the congregation joins in singing "Holy, Holy, Holy, Lord God of hosts," echoing the praise of the angels and saints in heaven. Following the Sanctus, the priest invokes the Holy Spirit during the Epiclesis, asking that the gifts of bread and wine be sanctified and become the Body and Blood of Christ. The priest then recites the words of institution, recalling the words Jesus spoke at the Last Supper: "This is my Body... This is my Blood." This mo-

ment, known as the consecration, is the pinnacle of the Eucharistic Prayer, where through the mystery of transubstantiation, the bread and wine are truly transformed into Christ's Body and Blood. The prayer continues with the Anamnesis, where the Church recalls Christ's Passion, Resurrection, and Ascension into heaven. The priest then offers intercessions for the living and the dead, invoking the saints and praying for the unity of the Church. The prayer concludes with the final doxology, where the priest, lifting up the chalice and paten, praises God the Father through Christ in the unity of the Holy Spirit. The congregation responds with a heartfelt "Amen," affirming their participation in this sacred prayer.

Why We Do It:

The Eucharistic Prayer is the heart of the Mass and embodies the very essence of Christian worship. It is a profound act of thanksgiving and consecration, through which the faithful are united with Christ's one perfect sacrifice. By recalling the Last Supper and Christ's sacrifice on the cross, the Paschal Mystery is made present in our midst, and we are invited to share in the fruits of Christ's redemption. The Eucharistic Prayer is a moment of deep communion with God, where the faithful offer their own lives in union with Christ's offering and receive the grace and strength to live out their faith in the world. The structure of the Eucharistic Prayer reflects the rich tradition of the Church and its roots in the earliest Christian communities. It is a moment where heaven and earth meet, where the faithful join in the eternal worship of God, and where the mysteries of our salvation are celebrated and made present. The Eucharistic Prayer is not only a prayer of the Church but a prayer for the Church, uniting all the faithful in the one Body of Christ.

It was St John Chrysostom's Feast Day on Friday 13th Sept? John's father died when he was young, and he was raised by a very pious mother. Well educated; studied rhetoric under Libanius. one of the most famous orators of his day.



Monk. Preacher and priest for a dozen

years in Syria. While there he developed a stomach ailment that troubled him the rest of his life. It was for his sermons that John earned the title Chrysostom = golden mouthed. They were always on point, they explained the Scriptures with clarity, and they sometimes went on for hours. Made a reluctant bishop of Constantinople in 398, a move that involved him in imperial politics. He criticized the rich for not sharing their wealth, fought to reform the clergy, prevented the sale of ecclesiastical offices, called for fidelity in marriage, encouraged practices of justice and charity. Archbishop and Patriarch of Constantinople. Revised the Greek Liturgy. Because John's sermons advocated a change in their lives, some nobles and bishops worked to remove him from his diocese; he was twice exiled from his diocese. Banished to Pythius, he died on the road.

Greek Father of the Church. Proclaimed Doctor of the Church in 451.

"When you are before the altar where Christ reposes, you ought no longer to think that you are amongst men; but believe that there are troops of angels and archangels standing by you, and trembling with respect before the sovereign Master of Heaven and earth. Therefore, when you are in church, be there in silence, fear, and veneration." - Saint John Chrysostom
