Parishioners will recall that for many months there has been lots of talk and promotion of the Hope and Renewal Summit to be held in Palmerston North. Friday 3 October was the day. New Plymouth was enveloped in fine misty rain as we left. At Midhurst this disappeared and from there it was a fine run to Palmerston North, Awapuni Racecourse, except for those who were caught in roadworks at Turakina with unbelievably long delays. 24 parishioners (mostly pictured above) from the Catholic Parish of New Plymouth attended with Fr Simon and Fr Sobin. The schedule is opposite. 4 Keynote addresses with Fr James Mallon, founder of Divine Renovation and Matt Regitz Director of Coaching Divine Renovation, plus three Breakout Sessions for each participant from a choice of 18 options. It was full on, non stop, but still offered time for prayer and quiet in the Prayer Room with Eucharistic Adoration and Reconciliation. Each parish sat in their own groups. The New Plymouth group had two tables in the front row. Natalie and Barbara because they had been so delayed at Turakina sat with the group from Bulls. This is where we sat for all the group sessions: Mass, the Key note speeches, the testimonies, Prayer with the Holy Spirit and Praise and Worship. The music and Praise and Worship was incredible. On Saturday 8 November at 10.00am, at St Joseph's Church, we will remember our loved ones who passed away during 2024.



Breakout Session Saturday Morning: A Parish That Dreams: Forming and Casting a Vision Track.

Roly Devine and Fr Simon led a session on vision. At the heart of leadership is the ability to provide a vision for the community. A God-inspired vision, that has been prayed for and is in fact a God sized vision. Not diminished by the thoughts of being realistic, rather, the dream of a 'golden age' of an amazing parish - a dream come true.

Once the vision has been established it needs to be communicated, to be sung. Leaders in the parish need to be poets of the vision and carriers of the dream. People are inspired with hope and passion for a vision that they have contributed to the forming of and have come onboard the waka to help steer it towards the destination, the vision. Vision is a unifying dream that leaders in the parish share. Vision combined with action and with the Holy Spirit will produce amazing things.



Hope and Renewal Summit

Two Bell Blockians were among the 500 people who attended the Summit. We came home full of hope, spiritually energised and eager to share what we had experienced with our community, which we did during our Mission Sunday liturgy at Bell Block last Sunday.

We learnt so much from the inspiring speakers and breakout sessions. Two key points were: The Holy Spirit needs to be the driving force in a community, and the Eucharist must be the centrepoint.

We learnt that the key to a thriving parish is hospitality, a really welcoming community, reaching out to everyone, not just people we know but especially people we don't know or don't feel attracted to. We felt our community is doing well but there is plenty of room for improvement.

Another insight was the importance of <u>accepting people</u> where they are at and how important it is to <u>recognise</u> each person's gifts / skills and to encourage them to <u>share their gifts / skills in the community</u>.

On the way home we discussed how we could share these learnings and hopefully encourage these and other insights within our Bell Block community.

Hope and Renewal Summit

Some of my take aways from The Hope and Renewal Summit were around the importance of ensuring as a parish community we are welcoming. One of the quotes from Jacinta Nicholls, whose breakout was titled 'Belong, Believe, Behave,' was that 'we can't be guests in our own parish. We are actually all hosts.' She spoke on the importance of all members our parish community thinking about how they can be welcoming to each other and to newcomers.

I think it is especially important for us be to be welcoming to those that are just beginning to explore the Catholic faith within our parish. *K.M.*

(With reference to the Breakout Session Belong, Believe, Behave: Building Community and Hospitality with Jacinta Nicholls, St Peter Chanel Parish Waimakariri)

Fr Vui was at the Summit and being the Administrator of the Parish of the Cathedral of the Holy Spirit, he played a key role in Summit organising and planning. Fr Vui was at the lectern in the closing sessions. We had been praying, calling on the Holy Spirit with the Laying On of Hands.

Fr Vui said to the 500 participants "I was being prayed for by others, and I looked up across the room. My eyes rested on Fr Simon, my former parish priest. Fr Simon was surrounded by New Plymouth parishioners praying for him, with their hands on his shoulders. In that I saw an image of a family. An image of a close family praying together. This image captured my heart & stilled me. I felt the very close presence of the Holy Spirit in the room".



My question after two days at the Summit is

"What does The Holy Spirit want me to do?" I pray that I may see the path and hear the call the Holy Spirit has for me. I want to follow. Guide me Holy Spirit. J.H.

He talks about how we are on the adventure of mission, together we experience hope and new life through the gospel and through love for others. No one has all the gifts: if we want to move quickly, we go alone, but if we want to go far, we go together. ME.

Hope and Renewal Summit

At the Hope and Renewal Summit 2025, I had the privilege of serving as the Hospitality and Volunteers Coordinator alongside 62 brothers and sisters from across Aotearoa.

Growing up in a Catholic family, I was taught that the journey of faith involved three steps: first, to *believe* – in God, in Jesus, and in the Holy Spirit; second, to *behave* – as belief required certain behaviours (do this, but don't do that); and lastly, to *belong* – faith provides a sense of belonging to family, a faith community, and even to God himself. However, my perspective has changed. I have learned, as highlighted by Divine Renovation, that transforming parishes from maintenance mode to mission-focused communities involves adopting a new culture where people first feel they *belong* to a welcoming community. From there, they are encouraged to *believe* in their faith, and finally, they are inspired to *behave* in ways that reflect their new life in Christ.

During the summit, I was fortunate to put this concept into action. We created an inviting environment where attendees felt welcomed and that they belonged. We greeted people as they arrived in the car park and throughout the day, guiding them through the venue, which was quite a maze. At the end of the day, we sent them off with a smile, and the next day, we arrived bright and early to welcome them again. As a parting gift, we handed out chocolate favours with warm smiles, hoping that this welcoming experience would inspire them to carry the same spirit back to their home parishes.

Having previously experienced feelings of being unwelcome at Mass, before I came to New Plymouth I understand the discomfort the lack of welcome can cause. Drawing from my personal experiences and those at the Hope and Renewal Summit 2025, I am eager to see our parish become a welcoming community.

What I gained from the Summit is the clarity that we are heading in the right direction as we transition from maintenance to mission. There is still work to be done to breathe life into our parish vision and implement our mission plan.

I look forward to seeing where God leads us in 2026. Susilo

On Friday night, first night of the Summit Fr Simon Story, of this parish presented a testimony. A narrative of a part of his priestly journey. I was surprised to see Fr Simon on the stage in front of more than 500 participants and clergy. This wasn't in the schedule (only the key note speeches were) and in all the pre Summit discussions a testimony from Fr Simon hadn't been mentioned. But from that surprise, for me this was the highlight of the Summit. This was our Fr Simon, our priest who works so closely with us and for us, talking about what he heard and saw and felt. Our Fr Simon whom we might think we know. It was honest, it was sincere, it was moving. But more than that, it was hopeful and it was encouraging. A courageous reflection that made my heart stop, a reflection that made me smile in gratitude. It was laying out a path for the future, a future, where we just need the impetus to take one tiny little step to begin the journey.

Father Simon said....

"When I was training for priesthood and close to ordination, I spent some time in Napier with an older priest who was preparing to leave ministry as I was preparing to enter it. Tim Hannigan, one of the last Irish priests in NZ had become a firm friend and mentor to me. Well after he had departed this life, I had been a priest for maybe 10 years, I remember returning to his grave for a chat - to ask him what was to become of me. I was struggling and I asked for his help, his prayers. I felt lost, I was depressed, racked with anxiety, I guessed I had probably misread my priestly calling - I didn't realise it was so crushing. There I was in a cemetery; I was in Ezekiel's valley of dry bones. At a loss for what could be done in a parish, I figured that life in a monastery might be my best option to run to, or I could just leave.

Parish life was doing me in. The slow exit of families, young people, and even senior parishioners, from the life of the parish was a painful reality. The <u>ongoing</u> absence of so many people on a Sunday, who were there only a few years ago. The sacraments of initiation that were celebrated, baptism, first communion, confirmation, was the <u>beginning</u> and the <u>ending</u> of most family's participation in the life of the parish. I clearly remember a classmate from St John's college turning up in Hastings, to have a child baptised. He and his family presenting themselves felt like a reconnection for me. After the baptism, they never returned. In fact, I became conscious that no other classmates were in the parish either. I wondered what had happened that they <u>all</u> had no interest in the parish family. Couples preparing for marriage, would after the wedding, disappear. Time I invested with children and families in schools was great, however this would end with the entire family graduating from <u>the school and from the parish</u>, never to make contact again. This led me to despair for the future. This would occur over and over and over.

I was frustrated, hurt and angry, discouraged, depressed and at a loss for what could be done.

And then, one day, I heard a message that was to change my priestly ministry and give me hope.

At a national assembly of NZ priests in Christchurch in 2018, I heard about the incredible changes that can come about through a mission-oriented parish, focusing in on evangelisation, the Holy Spirit and leadership. This is what I needed to hear! I felt that dim flame of hope within me flicker. I knew I needed some joy in priestly work, some pas-

sion and hope for a future that was worth working towards. Focusing in on these things and the living Jesus among us, and on how to place people on the doorstep of a meeting with the Holy Spirit, with a high chance of igniting discipleship in Jesus Christ, has been life changing for me. As a friend once told me, there is no greater joy than seeing people come into a relationship with Jesus Christ in the parish. I too have experienced this.

Over the past few years, I have been part of a team of parishioners who have seen whole families arrive at the parish, ask to be baptised and want to be engaged in the life of the parish and in due course be sent out into the world themselves. As a priest that experience is so significant, it has brought me so much joy, and joy to everyone else in the parish who sees it happening!



A missional parish model has simply transformed my priestly ministry, and I believe the life of our parish. Making disciples of Jesus Christ, going fishing, putting out into the deep, has brought me a passion and excitement and peace I didn't know of before."




